

Reading Comprehension Activities (RCA)

Purpose: This RCA packet is designed to reinforce and extend basic literacy skills. In high school and college, students are expected to complete reading assignments independently on a daily basis. Students who deliberately develop strategies for reading comprehension are more likely to be successful academically across content areas.

All incoming freshmen can expect initial assessments in English I to be focused on the summer read. Completion of this packet during reading will provide students with a ready reference for class discussion and assignment/assessment completion. While most English teachers will not require or expect students to complete the reading guide, they may allow use of a completed reading guide during assessments.

RCA for Chapters 1-8

<u>Chapter Summaries</u>	
1	Exposition - narrator introduces best friend (Delaney Doyle), and reveals that his papaw is in poor health (some serious condition related to the function of his lungs). Setting of the novel is unclear, though narrator mentions the Pigeon River, which runs through Tennessee, and use of the term "papaw" suggests Appalachian dialect.

Jeff Zentner (the author) uses a first-person narrator to tell this story. Events are relayed through the perspective of Cash Pruitt, which allows the reader to understand more deeply the inner conflicts Cash wrestles with as he contemplates the decision of whether to follow Delaney to Middleford Academy in Connecticut, or stay in in Sawyer, Tennessee. His affection for his friend is evident in the way he describes her ("I've always thought she had a strangely elegant beauty" (pg. 19)), though he doesn't seem to understand the depth of his own emotions toward her.
