

There is no doubt that we have a pretty amazing space at MUHS. Unfortunately, it is easy to grow complacent and take this awesome space for granted. Who is responsible for keeping the MUHS community space looking good? Believe it or not, that responsibility rests with all of us. Here are some easy and practical ways each of us can care for our common home:

- 1) Reduce the use of plastics by bringing your own water bottle and filling it at one of our water stations. Water is good for our brains and this practice is environmentally friendly.

However, with the influx of Greco-Arabic science and natural philosophy into Western Europe during the twelfth and thirteenth centuries, the Christian attitude toward science changed dramatically.
